>>> HOUSEKEEPING <<<

- All animals entered for sale at any ILCS sale must be resident in the vendor's herd for the 6 CONSECUTIVE months prior to the sale date.
- It is important to highlight the 1.7kg males and 1.5kg females max weight gain for calves. Unless calves are notified at birth - Calves that exceed these Daily Live Weight Gain will not be allowed participate in ILCS sales or ILCS shows or any Club events.
- For the integrity of the Herdbook and to safeguard breeders, from 1st September 2019 all 1st calved heifers must be Parentage Verified at the owner's expense before their calf can be registered.
- Pedigree Females bought into your herd need to have Pedigree Certificate submitted to the Office for transfer into new owners name to avoid Pedigree Certificates for Calves being held up in TNP (Transfer not Paid)

All Animals being entered in Limousin Society Sales must be Genotyped and Results back prior to Sale Entry



>>> REPORT ON THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of the Irish Limousin Cattle Society took place on 18th November in the Bridge House Hotel in Tullamore.

Following the President's address and the Auditor's report a series of questions were asked from the floor. These questions were submitted in advance of the meeting.

The main topics that arose were individual accounting issues, the cost effectiveness of the bull purchasing concessions and the issuing of AGM packs through email in advance of the next AGM. There was also a call for rule changes in relation to Code of Conduct of Council Members, Age Based Retirement was also discussed. This broadened out to discuss term limits on Council and improvements to the Dispute Resolution mechanism.

There was a call to increase club funding and for genomic evaluation to be done at the time of entry to sales. Calls were also made to improve communication protocol in the future. Council were asked to report back to members after a four month period on their progress in their new term and also to proceed with the advertising of the post of Breed Secretary.

>>> GARDA VETTING UPDATE

Most Clubs now have person(s) Garda Vetted. For Clubs to run YMA Events it is essential that the Club have a minimum of 2 people Garda Vetted and that they have complete the Tusla Course.

Child Saftguarding Statement / Protection Policy and Risk Assessment Policy are available on our Website.

Gerry O'Connell will work with Clubs in 2024 to ensure the society is fully compliant when running YMA events.

LIMOUSIN GENETICS BREAK RECORDS AT CARRICK WINTER FAIR

Carrick on Shannon Winter Fair was held over two weekends in November. What a showcase it proved to be for the breed. Limousin genetics were very well represented in the large entry of exceptional quality Commercial stock over the course of both weekends.

Colin McFadden and Ailish McBride from Letterkenny, Co. Donegal achieved a selling price of €18,400 for a July born weanling heifer. This outstanding heifer was the Reserve Junior Limousin Champion, she weighed 260kgs, and is sired by Ballinloan Jaegerbomb.

The Reserve Senior Limousin Champion heifer was from the herd of Shane Kelleher, Newmarket on Fergus. This Powerhouse Italic daughter weighed 740kg and sold for €5,850.

21 Senior Limousin heifers sold at an average of €3,000 with James & Noel McSweeney, Macroom, Co. Cork selling their 550Kgs Bullock for €4,000.On weanling sale day, 14 Limousin Bull Weanlings sold at an average of €1,832 with John O'Grady, Glenamaddy, Co. Galway getting the top price of €4,200 for his May Elite Forever Brill (TVR) calf weighing 380kgs.

Reserve Junior Limousin Champion, sold for €18,400

There was fantastic interest in the Limousin Heifer Weanlings with 100 selling at an average of €3.151.

Derrick Forde, Corrandulla, Co. Galway received €13,100 for his February born heifer, this heifer weighed 510kgs.

Sean Hughes, Co. Monaghan presented a smashing Ampertaine Elgin weanling, she weighed 350kgs and sold for €10800

Dermot McGinley, Letterkenny, Co. Donegal sold his April heifer weighing 390kgs for €8200. James Cunney, Aclare, Co. Sligo received €8,100 for his May calf weighing 320kgs.

Sweeney Brothers, Ardara, Co. Donegal sold their February calf weighing 380kgs for €7,800, while John O'Malley, Westport sold his January weanling, weighing 450kgs for €6,500.

Niall McKiernan, Ballinagh, Co. Cavan achieved €6,000 for his February calf weighing 420 kgs, while Sean O'Brien, Culdaff, Co. Donegal also achieved €6,000 for his April calf weighing 415kgs. Lydia Gallagher, Carrigart, Co. Donegal sold her April calf weighing 350Kgs for €5300.

Many of the cattle from other breeds were offspring of Limousin bred cows, a prime example of this was the granddaughter of Castleview Gringo that broke the record price in Carrick when she sold for a mouthwatering €21500. The heifer named Sugar n' Spice was bred by John Kennedy, Tullymore, Co. Donegal.

The Meenross Limousin herd from county Clare sold their first prize winning weanling bull for €4400, this 7-month-old bull calf has Ampertaine Elgin and Wilodge Vantastic in his lineage.

THE REVISED INDEXES

The only topic of discussion and of huge concern for pedigree breeders today are the new indexes. While ICBF present figures and I quote:

- "More suckler bred animals and less dairy bred animals at 5* after changes."
- "84% current 4-5* retain 4-5* status after changes"

The reality on the ground for Pedigree Limousin breeders is very different. The cow's replacement index has been negatively impacted the most. Taking our own herd as an example we had 20 4 and 5-star cows prior to the update. We now have 10. A 50% reduction is very different to 84%.

Many breeders have been following the advice from ICBF trying to breed 5-star cows, genotyping their animals, weighing their calves a few times a year etc. Many of these 5-star cow had high reliability scores. What has happened is ethically wrong and besides the financial impact, will have a wellness and mental health impact on breeders.

Council met with Donagh Berry (Teagasc) who developed the new algorithm for the Terminal index. When you will be reading this piece the Oireachtas Agriculture committee will have met with ICBF on Wed Dec 13th. Council members and breeders have spoken directly to some of the committee to explain the context of the issues and provided questions to ask/clarify on the day.

What is becoming very evident is that no one is aware of the impact of the new indexes specifically on the continental pedigree breeds. The article on the Farmers journal of Dec 9th highlighted the issue "Any evaluation model that puts a Dexter bull above a Charolais in term of an overall profit index has to be questioned. How can ICBF defend this?"

Donagh will source from ICBF the before and after data for the entire Limousin population. This will clarify the real impact on the breed and will provide key inputs to support any proposals.

The Limousin Society cannot force ICBF to revert to the previous indexes (on our own). This can only be achieved by pressure from other parties such as the Oireachtas Agriculture committee, the Department of Agriculture and the farm lobby groups. In the last week the momentum against the new indexes has grown substantially as more farmers are becoming aware of the impact on their stock.

We all realise that environmental changes are a key driver, however, the new algorithm may be optimising the calculation to reduce carbon emissions but this approach on it's own across the whole beef population will have a detrimental effect in other traits.

The pedigree herd exists for a totally different reason than the commercial herd. The make-up of a pedigree cow or pedigree bull, that exists to breed the seed-stock to improve the genetic merit of future generations, is very different to a commercial cow/bull. The outcome being looked for is that the pedigree stock (especially the cow and top bulls) are provided with some leeway in terms of the traits that are negatively impacting the current stars by applying a different calculation to this subset. The objective is to save the environment while still producing top class progeny.

LIMOUSIN CONTINUES TO BE THE #1 SUCKLER DAM

Given the reduction of the Suckler herd in recent years, a positive indicator for the Limousin breed is that it remains the number one Suckler dam and is nearly double the next highest breed. The quality of the Limousin cow was very evident again this year at the Carrick Winter Fair, with Limousin being the dams of many of the top priced animals across all breeds.

Below is the data from 2012 and 2022. A few insights stand out over the last 10 years:

WHERE DO BUYERS AT SOCIETY SALES COME FROM?

It is an interesting exercise every year to review where our buyers come from. This information can help in making decisions re mart locations for future or new sales. A few insights are:

- Over a fifth of cattle sold at society sales were to Galway based customers.
- Nearly 10% sold went to Northern Ireland and the UK.
- Nearly 40% went to three counties Galway, Clare, and Roscommon.

The National Livestock Show Tullamore was where the 32nd National Limousin Championships were hosted. Throughout the proceedings, the Limousin marquee was a hive of activity and around the showring there was a

great atmosphere overseeing the breeding talent on display.

The National Limousin Championships, kicked off at 10am with Mr. Douglas Graham from the Burnbank Herd in Scotland, tasked with the difficult job of judging some 22 classes across male and female sections.

It will be another National Championship to remember for William Smith's Milbrook Limousin herd based in Oldcastle, Co. Meath. It was Milbrook Nikkiespice ET, a 5-year-old cow, suckling a calf, (a daughter of famous Milbrook Gingerspice and sired by Ampertaine Elgin) who swept the boards and was tapped out as Overall Limousin Champion of the Show, after earlier being crowned Senior Female Champion and Overall Female Champion.

Bobby O'Connell from Clarina, Co. Limerick took the honours for the Overall Male Championship, with his 17-monthold bull, **Ballybrown Toby** after being tapped out as Senior Male Champion. **Ballybrown Toby** is sired by **Ampertaine Foreman** and out of **Roundhill Punanime** which was a sale topping female that Bobby purchased at the 2020 Roundhill & Castleview Genetic Advantage Sale.

Castlebrock Trafford ET, a March-2022-born bull, owned by Donal Moloney was awarded Reserve Overall Male Champion. **Castlebrock Trafford** was bred by Gerard Davis, sired by **Mereside Godolphin** out of **Lomond Lexie**.

In the Junior Male Championship, it was Tom Bailey with his September-2022-born bull, **Baileys Trump** who took home the champion sash. This bull was sired by **Wilodge Vantastic** and out of **Baileys Norma**.

The Reserve Junior Male was awarded to **Brackan Tick Tok**, bred by Padraig Gormley, Carrigallen, Co. Leitrim. A stylish September-2022-born bull sired by **Derrygullinane Kingbull** and out of **Esker-Hill Karen ET**.

Micheal Roche from Abbeyfeale, Co. Limerick, took the honours of Junior Female Champion with his yearling heifer – **Knockcoolkeare Toffee** sired by the Al bull **Elite Lazette** and out of **Wood Road Nollaig**.

The Reserve Junior Female Champion spot was awarded to **Carrickmore Tina** from the Connell Brothers in Oldcastle, Co. Meath. Out of **Baileys Iceprincess** and sired by **Ampertaine Nugent**, a stock sire in Tom Bailey's herd. At the end of the show, the Ardnacrusha herd of Donal Moloney finished the day in style by winning the Best Pair of Limousins by the same breeder.
